# POLICE BEAT

According to the Illinois Department of Transportation's (IDOT) crash data for 2008, by mid-November there had already been 249 deaths due to alcohol-related crashes on Illinois roads.

To help make a positive change in these statistics, the Bartlett Police Department continues to work with the Secretary of State's Office and IDOT to enforce Illinois DUI laws and make Village roads safe from drunk drivers.

During the second half of December, as well as periods in February and March, Bartlett Police will participate in IDOT's mini-grant alcohol enforcement program (MAP). The campaign uses highly visible increased enforcement of impaired driving laws to reduce the incidence of alcohol related motor vehicle crashes and the resulting injuries and fatalities.

In Illinois, a driver is legally considered to be under the influence if he/she has a blood-alcohol concentration (BAC) of .08 or more, has used any illegal substance or is impaired by medication. A driver's BAC is based on the ratio of alcohol to blood or breath. However, an individual with a BAC between .05 and .08 may be convicted of DUI if additional evidence determines that the driver was impaired.

The effect of alcohol on an individual is determined primarily by two factors: the amount of alcohol consumed and the rate at which it is absorbed by the body. Other contributing factors include gender, weight, alcohol tolerance, envi-

ronment and the amount of food consumed.

The only way to rid the body of alcohol is time. Fresh air, coffee, a shower and food cannot help a person become sober. It takes about one hour for the body to metabolize one drink.

Each of the following has a comparable amount of alcohol and counts as one drink: one 12-ounce mug of beer, one 5-ounce glass of wine or one 1.5-ounce shot of hard liquor. (The amount of alcohol in a poured/mixed drink is dependent on the type of drink and the person who pours it.)

Penalties for DUI in Illinois vary depending on the circumstances of the arrest and conviction. These circumstances may include the driver's age, the driver's BAC level, whether the driver was transporting a child under age 16, and whether the driver has previous DUI convictions. The 2008 Illinois DUI Fact Book, available for download at [www.cyberdriveillinois.com](http://www.cyberdriveillinois.com), offers comprehensive information about the state's DUI laws and the penalties for violators.

Effective Jan. 1, 2009, a first-time DUI offender who wishes to obtain and is eligible for driving relief during the suspension period must have a Breath Alcohol Ignition Interlock Device (BAIID) installed on his/her vehicle.

Also, the suspension period for a first offense for failing chemical testing will increase to 6 months; and the suspension period for a first offense for refusing to submit to chemical testing will increase to 12 months.

# Keeping the Holidays

There are many ways to reduce your impact on the environment during the holiday season. From simple things like giving green gifts to decorating green and setting an earth-friendly holiday table, you can enjoy the season without creating excess waste.

## Holiday Parties

- ~ Turn down the heat before the guests arrive. You'll save energy while the extra body heat of your guests warms up the room.
- ~ After the party, don't throw away the leftovers! Put them in plastic containers or bags and send them home with guests, or donate to food banks.
- ~ Remember to collect and recycle waste paper, plastic bottles and aluminum cans after the party.

## Holiday Lighting & Decorations

- ~ Get outdoor light strands that are wired in parallel. These have separate circuitry so that if one bulb blows out, the rest will keep shining; all you have to do is replace the bulb.
- ~ Use lower wattage bulbs (e.g. mini lights or five watt bulbs) to reduce energy usage. The reduced heat from the bulbs will make your lights safer.
- ~ Look for LED (light emitting diode) holiday lights that can use up to 95% less energy than standard incandescent light strands.
- ~ Replace incandescent floodlights with halogen.
- ~ To avoid running up your electrical bill, use an automatic timer, both indoors and out. You'll remove the burden of turning the lights on and off, and avoid leaving them on all night or during the daylight hours. Just make sure that the timer you use is rated to handle the total wattage of lights.
- ~ Get a tree that can be planted or arrange to have your tree ground up as mulch afterward.
- ~ Reuse holiday decorations.

## Pictures

- ~ Purchase a reusable camera instead of a single use camera to conserve resources. If you buy a single use camera, take it to a film developer who will send it back to the manufacturer for recycling.
- ~ Purchase film rolls of 36 exposures instead of 12 to reduce packaging waste.



## Shopping

- ~ When holiday shopping, bring your own shopping bags. Paper, plastic and cloth are all good; they can be carried easily in your pocket or purse.
- ~ Consolidate your purchases into one bag rather than getting a new bag at each store.
- ~ When buying electronics, toys or other gifts that require batteries, remember to buy rechargeable batteries or a plug in A/C adapter.

## Gifts & Gift Wrapping

- ~ When giving oversized gifts like bicycles, forego the wrapping paper and just tie a bow on them.
- ~ Reduce, reuse, and recycle gift-wrap.
- ~ Wrap gifts in old maps, newspapers, Sunday comics or fancy holiday gift bags that are reusable. Kids' artwork is a perfect wrapping for presents to proud grandparents.
- ~ Give gifts that create little waste, such as movie, theatre or sports passes, concert tickets or memberships.
- ~ Keep an eye open for products made from recycled materials or that are energy efficient.
- ~ Donate unwanted gifts (along with last year's gifts that are not used anymore) to charity.

## Holiday Dinners

- ~ Turn your food waste into compost, a great natural fertilizer. Fruits, vegetables, and their peels, pits and seeds are all perfect for composting.
- ~ Avoid using one-time consumables such as paper cups, dishes, napkins and plastic utensils.
- ~ When you buy the ingredients for your delicious holiday dinner, consider buying products that are locally or regionally produced.

## Holiday Cards

- ~ Look for recycled content greeting cards. Better yet, send paperless e-cards.

# Home Heating Safety

The high cost of home heating has caused many Americans to search for alternatives for staying warm. The use of fireplaces and wood burning stoves is growing, and space heaters are selling rapidly. However, all these methods are major contributors in residential fires. The United States Fire Administration (USFA) encourages you to practice the following fire safety steps to keep those home fires safely burning.



## Keep Fireplaces and Wood Stoves Clean

- \* Have your chimney or wood stove inspected and cleaned annually by a certified chimney specialist.
- \* Clear the area around the hearth of debris, decorations and flammable materials.
- \* Use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces and leave glass doors open when a fire is burning.
- \* Install stovepipe thermometers to help monitor flue temperatures.
- \* To prevent a fire as a result of creosote buildup, keep air inlets on wood stoves open, and never restrict air supply to fireplaces.
- \* Use fire-resistant materials on walls around wood stoves.

## Safely Burn Fuels

- \* Never use flammable liquids to start a fire.
- \* Use only seasoned hardwood. Soft, moist wood accelerates creosote buildup.
- \* Build small fires that burn completely and produce less smoke.
- \* Never burn cardboard boxes, trash or debris in your fireplace or wood stove.
- \* When building a fire, place logs at the rear of the fireplace on an adequate supporting grate.
- \* Never leave a fire in the fireplace unattended.
- \* Extinguish the fire before going to bed or leaving the house.
- \* Soak hot ashes in water and place them in a metal container outside your home.

## Protect Your Home Outside & In

- \* Stack firewood outdoors at least 30 feet away from your home.
- \* Keep the roof clear of leaves, pine needles and other debris and cover the chimney with a mesh screen spark arrester.
- \* Remove branches hanging above the chimney, flues or vents.
- \* Install smoke alarms on every level of your home. Test them monthly and change the batteries at least once a year.

- \* Properly vent all heating equipment. Extend all vent pipes at least three feet above the roof.

## Electric Space Heaters

- \* Buy only heaters rated by a nationally recognized laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- \* Check for a thermostat control mechanism that switches off automatically if the heater falls.
- \* Heaters are not dryers or tables; don't dry clothes or store objects on top of your heater.
- \* Space heaters need space; keep combustibles at least three feet away from each heater.
- \* Always unplug your heater when not in use.

## Prevent Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

- \* Install at least one carbon monoxide alarm with an audible warning signal near the sleeping areas and outside individual bedrooms. Make sure the alarm is rated by a nationally recognized laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratories (UL). Carbon monoxide alarms measure levels of CO over time and are designed to sound an alarm before an average, healthy adult would experience symptoms. Although you may not be experiencing symptoms when you hear the alarm, it does not mean that CO is not present.
- \* Have a qualified professional check all fuel burning appliances, furnaces, venting and chimney systems at least once a year.
- \* Never use your range or oven to help heat your home, and never use a charcoal grill or hibachi inside your home or garage.
- \* Never keep a car running in a garage. Even if the garage doors are open, normal air circulation will not prevent a dangerous buildup of CO.
- \* When purchasing an existing home, have a qualified technician evaluate the integrity of the heating and cooking systems, as well as the sealed spaces between the garage and house.

# IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER

## **Bartlett's water has levels of Barium above drinking water standards.**

The Village of Bartlett water system has exceeded a drinking water standard. This is not an emergency, but as customers, you have the right to know what happened, what you should do, and what the Village is doing to correct this situation. The Village routinely monitors for the presence of drinking water contaminants. Testing results received in November 2008 show that the **running quarterly average** for the system exceeded the standard or maximum contaminant level (MCL) for barium. The standard for barium is 2 milligrams per liter (mg/L). The **average** level of barium over the last year was 3 mg/L. This level was found in April 2008, in only one of Bartlett's seven wells, which are blended in the distribution system. It is important to realize that the water being produced right now is well below the EPA level for Barium, but the average is still high, requiring the Village to publish this notice.

### **What should I do?**

You do not need to use an alternative (e.g., bottled) water supply. However, if you have specific health concerns, consult your doctor.

### **What does this mean?**

This is not an immediate risk. If it had been, you would have been notified immediately. However, some people who drink water containing barium in excess of the MCL over many years could experience an increase in their blood pressure.

### **What is being done?**

This notice is a continuation of a quarterly notice based on an April 7, 2008 test that showed this well violated the Environmental Protection Agency's Barium level standard. Subsequently, that well was immediately taken out of service and Water Remediation Technologies (WRT) replaced the media filter and the well was put back on line on July 5. All tests are now well within the EPA standards and have been since the well was put back on line.

Our requirement for notification of this April 7 event is due to the EPA's rule for using running four quarter sample results.

# LET IT SNOW!

Bartlett streets are plowed in the following order: main streets, secondary collector streets, cul-de-sacs and dead-end streets. Priority is given to the most heavily traveled streets.

Parking on Village streets is prohibited after 2 inches of snow has fallen to allow plows to remove snow and completely clear the street. It's a good idea to wait until after the final pass of the plow to shovel the end of your driveway.

DO NOT shovel snow into the street. This can cause the formation of ice patches and has the potential for causing serious accidents.

The Village clears snow from sidewalks surrounding public buildings, the commuter areas it maintains, and crosswalks near local schools. The Village does not clear neighborhood walks.

**Please be a snow angel and shovel your sidewalk**, especially if you live near a school, so children and other pedestrians in your neighborhood can walk with greater ease. Also, please clear snow from around fire hydrants and storm sewers. If you have any questions or concerns regarding snow removal, please call Public Works, 630-837-0811.
