

Memorial Day Walk

Stay Connected, Stay Informed



The Village of Bartlett is encouraging residents to sign up for the CodeRED Emergency Notification System. This free service gives Village staff the ability to quickly notify residents of emergencies and other high priority information via recorded voice or typed messages. The CodeRED notices can be delivered to the entire Bartlett community or to geographically targeted neighborhoods.

Bartlett has used the CodeRED system to share information about the Kickstand Classic Bicycle Race, an armed barricade situation on Gardenia Lane and a residential burglary incident on Wilcox Drive.

When you see 866-419-5000 on your caller ID, you will know the call is from Bartlett's CodeRED system. If you would like to hear the last message delivered to your phone, simply dial the number back.

If you reside or own property within the incorporated limits of Bartlett and would like to sign up for CodeRED emergency messages, please use the "How Do I" navigation tab at the top of the Village website homepage, www.village.bartlett.il.us and look for the CodeRED Notifications signup page in the drop-down menu.

Although the CodeRED system utilizes a public database for calling, you should not automatically assume that your phone number is registered with this service. Please be aware that you will not receive notifications if your phone number is not in the database. In addition to your landline phone, you also can register to be notified via cell phone, text message and email.

Hydrant Flushing

It's time for Bartlett Public Works to flush all fire hydrants. This process removes iron deposits from the water mains and ensures that hydrants are working correctly.

The flushing may cause temporary water discoloration. Please check for discolored water before doing any laundry during the dates the hydrants in your area are being flushed.

FLUSHING DATES

April 10 through April 16: all areas south of Stearns Road

April 17 through April 28: all areas north of Stearns Road

A Minute with the Mayor

Anticipating the expiration of its current water contract with the City of Elgin in 2019, the Village began exploring its options for municipal drinking water as far back as 2014.

In February, after multiple presentations and many months of discussion, the Board voted unanimously on a resolution approving the water purchase and sale agreement between Bartlett and the DuPage Water Commission (DWC). The Board also approved the financial agreements that will fund the capital improvements needed to make this important switch in our water supply.

We believe that this will be a huge and much anticipated improvement for the Village, bringing Lake Michigan water to all residents once the final connections are completed in 2019.

During the whole time the Board discussed its move to a new water source, we held off on the routine, biennial reviews of water and sewer rates. The last increase occurred in 2012.

A 20% increase in the water rate and a 20% increase in the sewer rate are proposed to begin on May 1.

Although a rate increase would have occurred even if Bartlett had chosen to renegotiate its water purchase contract with the City of Elgin, the transition to Lake Michigan water requires engineering and water main replacement costs, which account for a substantial portion of the water rate hike. The proposed sewer rate increase is largely impacted by necessary improvements to the wastewater treatment plant.

Cook and Kane County residents can expect to see their monthly water bills go up by approximately \$10.42, while the increase for DuPage residents will be about \$12.19.

Bartlett's current water and sewer rates are in the bottom third compared to 26 neighboring communities that were surveyed. After the 20% increase in rates, the Village will still fall squarely in the middle of all surveyed municipalities.

Rates will need to be adjusted again during the next two to three years as infrastructure improvements continue, but these incremental increases will be offset to some degree once the new water connection is complete and residents can remove their water softeners.

Providing safe and reliable tap water in a cost efficient manner is one of the most vital municipal services that the Village of Bartlett provides to its residents and businesses. We feel confident in our choice of the DWC, which has been providing its members a high quality and reliable water supply for many years. We look forward to being a member.

...the Village offers automatic bill payment for water and sewer customers. You can have your monthly water and sewer bill payment automatically deducted from your checking or savings account.

No more late payments. No more checks. No more postage.

You will continue to receive your monthly bill showing your water consumption and the date and amount of your payment.

The **Automatic Bill Payment Service** is a free service offered by the Village and participation is easy. Bartlett High School (BHS) Principal Mike Demovsky is among 10 Chicago area finalists for the Golden Apple Foundation's Stanley C. Golder Achievement Leadership Award. The winner will be announced prior to a final awards ceremony on Saturday, May 20.

Demovsky, an educator for 18 years, began his career as a Spanish teacher. He became the principal of BHS this school year after serving as the principal of Kenyon Woods Middle School in South Elgin for four years and as an assistant principal at Streamwood High School for two years.

"I became a principal to help the most people possible. A principal can affect change with every student in the building and change the lives of teachers and the community," said Demovsky. "Being back at Bartlett means everything as I get to give back to the community that raised me as a teacher. It's an honor to be nominated for this award."

Since 2014, the Stanley C. Golder Leadership Award honors one exemplary pre-K through 12th-grade principal each year, who has served at one or more public or nonpublic schools for five or more consecutive school years. The winner will receive a \$10,000 cash award with \$5,000 going toward the administrator's professional development and \$5,000 to the school for a project of the recipient's choosing. The recipient also will be honored at the Golden Apple Awards Gala on WTTW Channel 11.

Lock it or Lose it!

Each spring, the Bartlett Police Department tends to see a rise in burglaries to motor vehicles. The department takes proactive measures to combat this trend, but there are simple things that residents can do to help prevent this crime: lock your vehicles, remove your keys and secure your valuables.

In many cases, a thief simply walks from car to car at night and tries the doors, taking anything deemed worthwhile from the unlocked cars. This method makes it easy to steal many items quickly, making virtually no noise. If the car doors



are locked and nothing of value is visible, the thief simply moves on to an easier target.

Be vigilant when it comes to your property and also help out your neighbors. If you see anything suspicious, be sure to

call 9-1-1 promptly. Also, please do not go through your vehicle before the police can collect evidence. Working together helps reduce opportunities and catches car thieves.

Get all the building permit information you need to start your next home improvement project at the Bartlett Park District's annual Earth Day celebration on Saturday, 4/22 at Bartlett Nature Center in James "Pate" Philip State Park, 2054 W. Stearns Road. Bartlett Building Department staff will be there from noon to 4 p.m. to answer questions and provide information about the Illinois Energy Conservation Codes. They can guide you through proper permitting so that your home not only looks great when your project is finished but also can be safely enjoyed for many years. Free CFL light bulbs, while supplies last.

Building permits are required because your home or business is an investment. If your construction project does not comply with Village codes, the value of your investment is reduced. Property insurers may not cover work done without permits and inspections. If you decide to sell a home or building that has had modifications without a permit, you may be required to make costly repairs. Also, by following code guidelines, the completed project will meet minimum standards of safety and be less likely to cause injury to you, your family and friends or future owners.

If you are hiring an outside contractor for your next home project, make sure whoever you hire is licensed and bonded to work in the Village. For a link to a list of licensed contractors, visit the Building Department page on the Village website, www.village.bartlett.il.us.

The Building Department will also be kicking off national Building Safety Month 2017 in May. Village Ordinance Reminders

...you cannot store **garbage and recycle totes** or lawn waste bags in front of your house. Please keep them in the garage or side or rear yards. Do not place garbage and recycling totes at the curb before 6 p.m. on the evening before pickup and remove them from the curb no later than 9 a.m. the day after pickup.

...**unlicensed/inoperable vehicles** are only allowed inside the garage.

...a Village ordinance requires anyone using an amplifier for a public or private event to obtain a permit. A recently approved amendment now allows the Community Development Department to approve **all amplifier permit applications** without the need for Village Board review.

BRUSH COLLECTION 2017

The Village of Bartlett chips brush (cut or broken branches) for residents from the beginning of April through November, weather permitting, according to the schedule below. Brush pickup is one of the Village's most popular programs, from a resident participation standpoint, and following a few rules ensures speedy collection and safe working conditions for Public Works employees.

Branches should be stacked neatly at the curb, cut ends facing the street, by the Sunday evening before collection. Thorny bushes, logs and stumps must be stacked separately since they can cause injury to Village employees and equipment.

* **Branch Length - minimum of 2 feet long, maximum of 8 feet long. Must be less than 6 inches in diameter.**

* **Brush must never be piled higher than 4 feet; this obstructs visibility for pedestrians & vehicles.**

* **Small sticks and evergreen clippings should be put into yard waste bags.**

There are no call backs if you miss your collection day. Brush should not be left in the parkway between collection dates. The brush removal program is for owners of single family homes performing work themselves, on their own property; private businesses and townhouse owners with associations that do their maintenance are not eligible for brush pickup. In addition, brush generated by tree services, landscape contractors or other services procured by the homeowner are not eligible for this program. The homeowner must arrange for removal of any contractor-generated brush at their own expense.

Brush piles that do not adhere to chipping requirements will be tagged, explaining why the brush was not removed and what steps to take to correct the problem.

Garden & Yard Waste - Garden debris, such as grass clippings, weeds, leaves, soil, rocks, boxes and bags are not brush and will not be picked up by the Village. From April through September, all garden waste must be placed in the specially marked Republic Services bags and placed alongside your household trash and recyclables for the weekly collection. Generic bags can only be used for fall leaf pickup in October and November.

Bartlett High School, Then & Now

Twenty years ago this coming August, Bartlett High School, 701 Schick Road, opened its doors to area students. But did you know this was not the Village's first high school?

The first Bartlett High School, a two-year program serving grades 9 and 10, opened in 1919. This addition to the education of Bartlett children was made possible by a law enacted at the time "having as its only aim and single purpose, the bringing of high school opportunities within the reach of every eighth grade graduate in Illinois and this without tuition expense to the pupil."

A.R. Davis, "a Chicago University man," served as the first principal and educator for the students. The single high school classroom was located in the Village's only school building, Bartlett School, a four-room structure once located at North and Hickory Avenues and relocated in 1929 to North and Eastern Avenues.

High school enrollment was small, around 16 students total. Historically, students were lucky to complete an eighth-grade education during the early 1900s. An article regarding the school in the 1923 Cook County Herald stated, "who does not avail himself or herself of this opportunity to get a high school education they will sincerely regret it in the future."

The high school students had their own social events, including plays like the 1926 production "Aunt Billie from Texas," with tickets going for 50 cents for adults and 20 cents for children. Sports teams, such as basketball and wrestling, were also part of student life.

After the two years, students had the option of completing their high school education at another school, such as Elgin or Palatine High Schools. In 1941, the original Bartlett High School disbanded and students traveled to Elgin High School for their education.

In 1997, Bartlett High School once again was part of the community. To celebrate the opening, the Bartlett History Museum curated the exhibit "Old Bartlett High vs. New Bartlett High," which compared the two schools. Alumni of the old Bartlett High met with Dr. Rick Hoy, the new school's first principal, and shared stories of what classroom life was like.

The museum has objects and images from both Bartlett High Schools but is always seeking to increase its collection, especially for the upcoming 20-year anniversary celebration. Specific items the museum is looking for are yearbooks, ticket stubs, handbills, photos and sport and spirit apparel.
